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As well as a busy Easter week we were celebrating Science Week too! This linked in so well as this term we had already been doing our exciting 'Egg-speriment' with eggs for Humpy Dumpty and thinking about sticky spider webs for 'Incy Wincy' as part of our Traditional Tales and Nursery Rhymes topic. Our science week celebration saw us investigating as entomologists in the school field and our focus was all about Bumble Bees.

We learnt about the importance of farming and why farmers are so important in helping us to look after insects. We then starting learning about the amazing bumble bee. We acted out the life cycle story learning about the important queen bee, the busy worker bees, the bumble bee eggs, larvae, cocoons and making new worker bees! We learnt that the bee is another animal that hibernates and then went exploring to see if we could find any bumble bee burrows. Along the way we

spotted willow trees, apple trees, dandelions, daffodils and daisies and thanked them all for providing the bees with pollen and nectar. We even managed to spot some burrows and found some larvae.

Finally, we talked about animals that like to eat bees and discovered that as well as badgers...robins do too! We looked at a robin's nest and compared it to a swallow's nest and a blue tit's nest.





What an action packed afternoon we had with SO many facts to take on board! I wonder what amazing facts you can remember? A perfect science week before our growing topic this half term... we are going to have so much fun exploring within our amazing school grounds.

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Ford fun day on the field...



March is a really important month in the life of our pond. The children learned how to pond dip safely and identified living things using identity charts including frogs, frogspawn, ram horn snails and newts.

It was great to see everyone working together to plan an Easter egg hunt. The children carefully hid their eggs and wrote clues to help others find them - some of the clues were a little tricky!

There was also drama - the children listened to a story set in a pond. They reflected on the pond as their inspiration and wrote and performed their creations to the rest of the class. There was a frog rap and a tale of a good frog versus an evil frog, to name but a few!



On Monday 15th March, Ford Class had an eggciting outdoor learning day in the school grounds along with Mrs Melkerts and Mrs Whyte.

The children loved learning about different types of nests and seeing some real examples and pictures of what nests were made from. They went on a nest hunt around school, thinking about places where nests might be, looking carefully using binoculars. Finally, the children built their own nests using some of the same materials that birds use to make their nests, including moss and mud.
