Dear parents and carers,

Good ventilation is an important tool to help reduce the transmission of COVID-19. The Department for Education is supporting schools to make sure our classroom are well-ventilated by providing us with carbon dioxide (CO2) monitors. CO2 levels as measured by these monitors are a proxy for good ventilation. As teachers and children breathe out CO2, the monitors can identify if it has built up in our rooms, which can indicate that ventilation needs improving.

We have been using these monitors in our school. Monitoring CO2 levels help us to assess the ventilation and determine when we need to let in some fresh air. This doesn't mean that all the windows need to be wide open all the time or that rooms need to be cold. In our school, we have found that opening windows when classrooms are empty or partially opening windows, rather than opening them fully is sufficient to ensure that all of our classrooms are well ventilated when lessons are taking place, helping us to balance good ventilation with keeping classrooms warm.

You may be aware that some schools are using air cleaning units in their classrooms. Although air cleaning units remove virus particles from the air, they do not improve ventilation and are not necessary in rooms which are well ventilated. After using our CO2 monitors regularly during the autumn term, we are confident that all our classrooms are well ventilated, and so we don't need to use any air cleaning units in our school.
